
### Cleanout storm drains on a biennial basis

- **Project Description**: Ensure that storm drains are cleaned on a regular and consistent basis in order to maintain adequate stormwater drainage as they were designed.
- Project Benefits: Reduces potential losses to buildings which could be damaged from catch basins not draining properly.
- **Status**: The Town continues to budget \$300,000 from the Stormwater Utility Fund for storm drain cleaning.

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
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### Cleanout storm drains on a biennial basis

## Improve drainage along the SFWMD C-100 canal


- through a dredging project
  Project Description: Mitigate/reduce flooding in the subbasin that currently outfalls to the canal by dredging the C-100 canal.
  - **Project Benefits**: Reduces potential losses to buildings which could be damaged from inadequate drainage within the canal.
  - Status: Caribbean Bridge Replacement and adjacent dredging design have been completed. Once the bridge replacement and adjacent dredging have been completed, the SFWMD has verbally committed to dredge canal from Caribbean Bridge to structure S21, near Black Point Marina. Estimated Cost \$1,456,08.06 The project is currently under way and the Town is attending construction progress meetings.



## Continue implementation of drainage system maintenance on all surface water channels, canals and ditches

- **Project Description**: Maintain all surface water channels, canals and ditches in order to ensure the proper storage, disposal and water quality treatment of runoff.
- *Project Benefits*: Reduces potential losses to buildings which could be damaged from channel, canals and ditches not operating properly.
- **Status**: Interlocal Agreement with Miami-Dade County was executed October 1, 2012. On September 25, 2017, the Town renewed the Interlocal Agreement which will commence on October 1, 2017 and ends on September 30, 2022. Project maintenance funding to be continued in the FY 20-21 Operating Budget. A new inter-local agreement was adopted by the Town Council via Resolution No. 22-31, and was approved by the BCC for another 5 years.





### PUBLIC NOTICE Flood Insurance Repetitive Loss Property

When our system of canals, disches and culverts was built over 20 years ago, it could handle all but the largest tropical storms and huminones; since then, urban development within Mami-Dade County has increased, thus also increasing the amount of stormwater runoff. Now, heavy rains overload the system more often, resulting in more frequent floods in your area with an average heavy event every 3 to 4 years.

The Town of Culter Bay is working diligently to improve the flood protection levets of service through our Capital improvement Program funded by the Town's Stormwater Ultifly Fund. We are coordinating thru Mismit-Dade Country with other agencies such as the South Florida Water Management District and the United States Army Corps of Engineers to increase the storage and carrying capacity of floodwaters in the surrounding primary canal system.

### What is the purpose of the NFIP and Floodplain Management?

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) enables properly owners in participating communities to purchase insurance against linear fine-fing

The NFIP is a federally supported program that assists communities and citizens who are devestaled by diseaters. The majority (76%) of federally declared disasters are food related, as most Americans live within close proximity to sources of flooding (e.g., rivers, coasts, lakes, etc.).

The role of Floodplain Management is to:

- Assist communities in avoiding potential flood losses.
- . Plan a course of action for when flooding occurs.
- Protect the integrity of floodplains from activities that compromise their natural functions




## Promote the purchase of flood insurance to residents and businesses

- **Project Description**: Increase the Town's flood insurance policy base to ensure that residents are adequately protected from flood damage. The Town's outreach program can increase the messaging in a number of ways to encourage the purchase of flood insurance including working with local insurance agents.
- **Project Benefits**: Pubic outreach and awareness that flood insurance is a homeowner's first line of defense against flood damage.
- **Status**: Residents are frequently given brochures at various Town events, Concerned Citizens meetings, Home Owner's Associations meetings/events, and through door hangers. ## Protect natural floodplain functions within the Town including the Cutler Wetlands, as defined by SFWMD

- **Project Description**: Preserve the Cutler Wetlands as a natural area on the east side of Cutler Bay to protect homes against storm surge and sea-level rise. Additionally, the wetland areas serve as a natural habitat for certain species of plant and animals which should also be protected.
- **Project Benefits**: Reduces potential losses to buildings which could be damaged from storm surge and sea-level rise.
- *Status*: Under CRS Activity 420, the Town continues to preserve its open space in the floodplain. The Town is currently part of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP). State Legislative Item # 2018-02 Cutler Bay Wetland Observation Pavilion (SW 97<sup>th</sup> Avenue) are currently being proposed as recreational additions to the floodplain. On August 21, 2019, the Town of Cutler Bay coordinated and hosted a meeting with all stakeholders to provide input essential for project's progress.






- Excerpt from the Town's Flood Protection Brochure :
  - Flood plains in our Town serve a beneficial purpose to our quality of life. These low areas are where rainfall goes to drain, and when the rainfall drains into the ground, this helps reduce flooding, and recharges our drinking water supply. Some examples of floodplains in Cutler Bay are the areas south of Lakes by the Bay community and the entire eastern border of the Town from SW 184 Street to SW 232 Street. These floodplains also serve as filters of storm water runoff as it seeps through the ground and into our aquifer. This aquifer is our only source of drinking water, and this filtering helps contain pollution before it reaches our aquifer. It is important that we appreciate our floodplains, and try to maintain, preserve, and keep these areas clean whenever possible.

- As per the Town's Land Development Regulations Section 3-63:
  - The Conservation District is composed of environmentally sensitive areas. It is intended to preserve and protect open spaces, park lands, wilderness areas, marshlands, watersheds and water recharge areas, scenic areas, beaches, and native flora and fauna. It is also intended to preserve areas for residents and visitors to view wildlife in their natural habitat as a passive recreational opportunity.
    - (1) Permitted Uses.
      - (a) Elevated Walkway [with railing]
      - (b) Undeveloped Passive Park and Open Space
      - (c) Scenic Viewing Tower
      - (d) Recreational Facility (be limited to trail, interpretive centers, viewing areas and other recreation uses deemed to be of low intensity)



A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF CUTLER BAY, COUNCIL RELATING TO THE ADOPTION OF THE TOWN FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT PROGRAM FOR PUBLIC INFORMATION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Town of Cutler Bay (the "Town") is vulnerable to harricane and other flood hazards that can cause loss of life and damages to public and private property; and

WHEREAS, the Town has been an active participant in FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) Program, which escourages communities to voluntarily implement standards, policies, and programs that go above and beyond the minimum NFIP regulations in return for lower flood insurance premium; and

WHEREAS, the Town's participation and documented activities in FEMA's CRS Program has cannot the Town a current classification rating of sin (6), which route in an arrival savings of twenty percent (20%) to all property owners who purchase flood instrance policies; and

WHEREAS, on July 37, 2013, the Town established a Floodplain Mitigation Plan Advisory Committee via Resolution No. 13-56 to assist the Town in the development and implementation of the Town's Flood Mitigation Plan, and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2015, the Town Council adopted the revised Flord Mitigation Plan via Resolution No. 15-37 with the added goal of lowering the Town's overall CRS, classification rating to five (5) which will result in a twently-five percent (25%) savings on all flord insurance promums purchased within the Town; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Town Council to protect its citizens and property from the effects of hurricanes, other flooding events, and to protect the natural floodplain functions by preparing and resistaining a comprehensive Town Floodplain Management Program for Public Information (the "PPT") under Activity 330 of the CRS manual; and

WHEREAS, the Town's Floodplain Miligation Plan Advisory Committee with the guidance of both Town staff and the Town's professional consultant (AMEC Environmental and Infrastructure, Inc.) have coordinated with FEMA's CRS Program representative to develop a PPI manual in accordance with the CRS credit criteria to further inform property owners of the flood and other hazards within the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council flinds that the adoption of the Town-Wide Program for Public Information is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town.







## Work with Miami-Dade County Emergency Management on identifying vulnerable populations for evacuations

- **Project Description**: Inventory and identify vulnerable populations within the Town to ensure that the elderly and those who are disabled are recognized by first responders. This is so their locations are established so that the emergency management officials understand where these populations reside in case evacuations become necessary.
- **Project Benefits**: Avoid possible loss of life.
- Status: The Town of Cutler Bay is currently in compliance with all requirements of Miami-Dade County Emergency Management. Project maintenance to be funded in FY 19-20 Operating Budget. Miami-Dade County has received a response from the State, the Flood Warning Plan has been approved. This activity has earned the Town an additional 269 points. The Town planned on hosting an educational workshop for Active Adults on the topic of hurricane preparedness for seniors in May 2020 but was postponed due to COVID-19. The Town's Public Works Director and Town Manager were Keynote Speakers in a ZOOM Virtual Meeting with the CBBA on June 11, 2020. Town staff performed an internal Hurricane Exercise with Homestead EOC in FY 2020-2021. On April 21, 2022 The Town coordinated with Miami-Dade EOC, a Disaster Preparedness Event which was held at East Ridge of Cutler Bay.

From June 2-9 the Town experienced a real-life flooding event in which Tropical Storm Alex produced 26 inches of rain in Cutler Bay flooding local streets. Town officials and EOC worked together to obtain resources for the purpose of mitigating the event.






## Work with Miami-Dade County Emergency Management and state and federal governments to protect vulnerable critical facilities

- **Project Description**: protecting critical facilities which operate as either evacuation centers or pump flood waters, or sewage should be protected from flood damage, so they perform without interruption.
- **Project Benefits**: Reduces potential damage to critical facilities.
- Status: Critical facilities, located within the Town, are up to date with Miami-Dade County and have filed their Emergency Procedures with Miami-Dade County EOC. The Town recently completed a Land Swap Deal which traded the existing Town Hall Building and South Parking Lot Parcel for 16 Acres of Vacant Land in the heart of Cutler Bay. The Vacant Land is approximately located on Old Cutler Road and SW 97<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The intent is to develop a new state of the art Municipal Town Hall Complex which will serve as the Town's Emergency Operation Center and be capable to withstand a Category 5 Hurricane Storm. On November 17, 2021, the Town Council unanimously voted to conduct a special mail ballot election for qualified electors of the Town to vote for the approval or rejection of the \$37 Million general obligation bond referendum for the purpose of financing the costs to develop a park, community center, and municipal building at the Property (via Resolution No.21-88). On March 25, 2022, , the Supervisor of Elections for Miami-Dade County certified the Official Results of the Cutler Bay Special Election (Mail Ballot) of which 5,650 ballots were received. The official results show 3,720 votes (or 65.84%) were in favor of the bonds and 1,930 votes (or 34.16%) were against.


**Project Description**: The existing drainage infrastructure in the Sub-Basins do not discharge adequate runoff to meet the desired performance criteria adopted in the Town's Stormwater Master Plan. The capacity of the existing roadside swales and French drains are not sufficient to discharge the volume of runoff and treat pollutants. Based on the CIP recommendations listed in the Town's Adopted Stormwater Master Plan, the Town will use the requested funding to improve the existing drainage system by, adding supplementary catch basins; replacing some existing catch basins; installing additional supplementary exfiltration trenches and pipes, milling and resurfacing of roadways, and sidewalk repairs. Existing catch basins will be modified to provide sediment traps (sumps) and pollution retardant baffles to protect the French drains. Additional French drains, catch basins, and/or manholes will provide water quality and water quantity treatment

**Project Benefits**: Reduces potential losses to structures which could be damaged from storm water ponding and prevents hazardous driving conditions for residents.

*Status*: Project under the planning stage.

**Funding source(s):** On March 2021, the American Rescue Plan ("ARPA") of 2021 passed into law, specifically the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds ("SLFRF"), which is meant to help towns and cities recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. The ARPA requires that Fiscal Recovery Funds may only be used to cover expenses incurred by the non-entitlement unit of local government by December 31, 2024. As specified in the Treasury Guidance, Eligible Use of Fiscal Recovery Funds allows improvements to stormwater Infrastructure systems. Allocated \$21,896,320.



This modification results in a recommendation that the community improve from a CRS Class 5 to a CRS Class 4. The community has met the Class 4 prerequisite. See Attachment for Class 4 Prerequisite summary. The following is a summary of our findings based on the submitted modification with the total modified points noted in parenthesis:

<u>Activity 310 – Elevation Certificates:</u> The Town of Cutler Bay's Building Division maintains elevation certificates for new and substantially improved buildings. Copies of elevation certificates are made available upon request. Elevation certificates are also kept for post-FIRM buildings. (39 points)

Activity 320 – Map Information Service: Credit is provided for furnishing inquirers with basic flood zone information from the community's latest Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). Credit is also provided for the community furnishing additional FIRM information, information about problems not shown on the FIRM, and historical flood information. (90 points)

Activity 330 – Outreach Projects: Credit is provided for informational outreach projects that include, general outreach projects, and targeted outreach projects. These projects are disseminated annually. Credit is also provided for having a pre-flood plan for public information. Credit is enhanced by having a Program for Public Information (PPI), and by having the information disseminated by stakeholders outside the local qovernment. (332 points)

Activity 340 – Hazard Disclosure: Credit is provided for state regulations requiring disclosure of flood hazards. (10 points)

Credit is also provided for having a pre-flood plan for public information. Credit is enhanced by having a Program for Public Information (PPI) and by having the information disseminated by stakeholders outside the local government. A progress report for the PPI must be submitted on an annual basis. (350 points)

Activity 340 - Hazard Disclosure: Credit is provided for community and state regulations requiring disclosure of flood hazards. (15 points)

Activity 350 – Flood Protection Information: Documents relating to floodplain management are available in the reference section of the Miami-Dade County Library. Credit is also provided for floodplain information displayed on the community's website. Credit is enhanced by having a PPI. (98 points)

(453 points)

Activity 440 – Flood Data Maintenance: Credit is provided for maintaining and using digitized maps in the day to day management of the floodplain. Credit is also provided for establishing and maintaining a system of benchmarks and maintaining copies of all previous Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Insurance Study Reports. (150 points)

<u>Activity 450 – Stormwater Management:</u> The community enforces regulations for stormwater management, low impact development, soil and erosion control, and water quality. Credit is also provided for watershed master planning. (174 points)

<u>Section 502 – Repetitive Loss Category:</u> Based on the updates made to the NFIP Report of Repetitive Losses as of May 31, 2016, the <u>Town of Cutler Bay, FL</u> has 32 repetitive loss properties and is a Category B community for CRS purposes. The community is required to submit either a Repetitive Loss Area Analysis or Floodplain Management Plan. (No credit points are applicable to this section)

Activity 510 – Floodplain Management Planning: Credit is provided for the adoption and implementation of the Town of Cutler Bay, Florida Floodplain Management Plan May 2015 adopted on May 1, 2016. Activity 370 - Flood Insurance Promotion: Credit is provided for assessing the community's current level of flood insurance coverage. (15 points)

Activity 420 – Open Space Preservation: Credit is provided for preserving approximately 44 percent of the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) as open space and preserving open space land in a natural state. Credit is also provided for regulations and incentives that minimize development in the SFHA. (791 points)

Activity 430 – Higher Regulatory Standards: Credit is provided for enforcing regulations that require freeboard for new construction and substantial improvement, foundation protection, cumulative substantial improvement, lower substantial improvement, protection of critical facilities, enclosure limits and local drainage protection. Credit is also provided for the enforcement of building codes, a Building Code Effectiveness Grading Schedule (BCEGS®) Classification and regulations administration. (443 points)

Activity 440 – Flood Data Maintenance: Credit is provided for maintaining and using additional map data in the day to day management of the floodplain. Credit is also provided for establishing and maintaining a system of benchmarks and maintaining copies of all previous FIRMs and Flood Insurance Study reports. (215 points)

<u>Activity 450 – Stormwater Management:</u> The community enforces regulations for stormwater management and soil and erosion control. Credit is also provided for watershed master planning. (297 points)

<u>Section 502 – Repetitive Loss Category:</u> Based on the updates made to the NFIP Report of Repetitive Losses as of January 20, 2018, the Town of Cutler Bay, FL has 32 repetitive loss properties and is a Category B community for CRS purposes. All requirements for a Category B community have been met. (No credit points are applicable to this section)

Activity 510 – Floodplain Management Planning: Credit is provided for the Town of Cutler Bay FL Flood Mitigation Plan, adopted on November 17, 2021, and for conducting a repetitive loss area analysis. A progress report for each plan must be submitted on an annual basis. (509 points)

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Activity 540 - Drainage System Maintenance: All of the community's drainage system is inspected regularly throughout the year and maintenance is performed as needed. Credit is also provided for listing problem sites that are inspected more frequently, and for implementing an ongoing Capital Improvements Program. The community enforces a regulation prohibiting dumping in the drainage system, and annually publicizes the regulation or has appropriate signs posted. (345 points)

Activity 610 - Flood Warning and Response: Credit is provided for a program that provides timely identification of impending flood threats, disseminates warnings to appropriate floodplain residents, and coordinates flood response activities. (249 points)

Activity 710 - County Growth Adjustment: All credit in the 400 series is multiplied by the growth rate of the county to account for growth pressures. The growth rate for Miami-Dade County, FL is 1.07.
